Meet Josh Velasquez - Friends Board Vice President



What is your hometown?

I grew up in Glendora, California, a suburb about 30 miles east of Los Angeles.

What is your current place of residence?

My family has lived in Plymouth since mid-2019. The three of us moved to Minnesota from Massachusetts in early 2019. Prior to our move, I spent 16 years in Massachusetts and the 18 years before that in California.

What hobbies do you have?

My newest hobby, as of 2022, is mastering my Cricut machine to create all kinds of fun paper and vinyl products – stickers, cards, iron-on t-shirt designs, scale 3D models of elevator interiors to help move a bookshelf, you name it! I'm also a casual collector of postcards, stickers, and postage stamps. (Stamp collecting is probably my oldest hobby, going back something like 30 years.)

What are your favorite genres to read?

I have a penchant for enjoying a really compelling non-fiction book. Our world is just so fascinating, and I appreciate authors and historians who can put that fascination into words for me to absorb. More on this topic below. (I'm finding, however, that many of the not-so-compelling professional development books I have to read for work are ruining the non-fiction genre for me. I need to keep an eye on that.)

What book has made the most impact on your life?

I had to dig deep for this one. After careful reflection, I'll respond with a book I read decades ago in middle school: <u>The Giver</u> by Lois Lowry. The book touched on themes which were off-limits in my generally sheltered existence until then, but I could get away with reading it because it was assigned in school. I vividly remember the effect this book had on my young brain, and I'm sure it planted some very early seeds of thought which still linger in my head to this day.

What is your favorite book?

Easy... Stephen King's <u>The Stand</u>. It's a guilty pleasure page-turner I can pick up and read over and over. (And I have.)

What was the last great book you have read?

<u>Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind</u>, by Yuval Noah Harari. This could be the modern-day answer to the "what book has made the most impact on your life" question for me. Harari does a masterful job of breaking down humanity as we know it into an immensely compelling historical exploration. (My answer to the next question might illuminate why this approach resonated with me so deeply.)

What are you really good at?

I have a knack for wrapping my head around complex topics and simplifying them to either make use of the information or to explain it. This manifests in my day-to-day life as being "tech support" for most of my friends and family, being quick with understanding and manipulating new tools and interfaces, and being good at creating information resources like how-to guides for colleagues at work.

What do most people not know about you that you are willing to share?

I eat pizza slices and sandwiches from the outer edges inward, saving the best bites for last. I also pulled out one of my own wisdom teeth. (With my dentist's approval and supervision, of course. I watched her take out the first three and asked if I could get the fourth! Teenagers, am I right?)

Why are you on the Board for the Friends of the Plymouth Library?

Being on the Board is a no-brainer for me. It's a great way to apply my skills as a consultant to make an impact on my immediate community, and it lets me extend my life-long relationship with libraries. My very first job as a kid was for my local library. As a college student, I worked part time as a library page. When I became a freelance designer and marketer, one of my favorite campaigns was for a university library. When my wife and I moved to Minnesota with our then two-year-old, the Hennepin County Libraries were amongst the first "attractions" we visited. And now, as a parent of a kindergartener, libraries take on a whole new level of significance for her education and development. Needless to say, libraries hold a special place in my heart.
