PLYMOUTH READS RETURNED AS A HUGE SUCCESS



Goldman had the crowd laughing with his dry wit and his self-deprecating remarks. He answered audience questions for more than an hour, welcoming questions about his stand up-comedy career, his work on the first seasons of the Seinfeld show and answering everything anyone asked about his books, writing process, even financial questions were allowed. Goldman was definitely "on" and everyone seemed to enjoy it. It didn't hurt that he praised the Plymouth Community Center venue and joked he was going to move to Plymouth! FYI, he currently lives in Edina but went to Armstrong High School in Plymouth.

Friends of the Plymouth Library Raises Awareness, Gives Away Hundreds of Kids' Books at Discover Plymouth

For the second year in a row, the Friends of the Plymouth Library (FOPL) proudly participated in Discover Plymouth, the city's annual community showcase featuring Plymouth-based non-profits, community groups, city services, and local businesses. The Plymouth Community Center's fieldhouse dome provided much-needed shelter from the rainy weather while hosting 88 exhibitors and a steady stream of attendees to the April 15 event.

The Friends of the Plymouth Library had the good fortune of being situated in the first aisle of exhibitors, meaning virtually every attendee passed our booth during their visit. Our vibrant booth drew the attention of hundreds of passers-by with our colorful display of flyers, posters, and giveaways, all aimed at raising awareness about the Friends and what we do. This year's awareness effort included an impressive shelf of hundreds of kids' books to be given away for free to kids and families visiting the

booth. (We made sure people knew they could also buy wonderful kids' books like these for as low as 50¢ at our used book sales.)

In exchange for the free books, our dutiful volunteers made sure each family walked away with a bundle of FOPL materials including a membership brochure, a book sales bookmark, a Plymouth Reads flyer, and a teaser bookmark for this summer's Garden Tour. Over the course of the five-hour event, we gave away nearly 200 books and promotional bundles, all thanks to the hard work of our FOPL Board volunteers: Board president Cathy Fischer, vice-president Josh Velasquez, and directors Carrie Almaer, Margaret Bird, and Brian Wilkerson, and teen director Shritha Devaraju.

The FOPL volunteers were joined by Plymouth librarian Angela Langeberg and her three tubs full of library flyers and goodies (plus a rather large Storm Trooper figurine to help advertise upcoming Star Wars-themed library events). Angela also came equipped to sign visitors up for new library cards, in support of the Hennepin County Libraries' strategic goal to make sure every resident in the county, no matter how young, has a library card.

For two years now, Discover Plymouth has proven to be a worthy investment of time and energy to build awareness in the community of the Friends of the Plymouth Library and what we do. We look forward to exhibiting FOPL again in the future, at Discover Plymouth and events like it. LITTLE FREE LIBRARIES





When driving around Plymouth, have you noticed any small boxes with windows planted on the side of the road? Look closer and you'll see books behind a display case. That is a public bookcase, where anyone can take books to read or leave books for others. It's called a Little Free Library.

The Little Free Library system was started by Todd Bol with help from Richard Brooks. He wanted to honor his late mother, who loved books and had been a school teacher. The first location was on his own front yard and, together with Brooks, Todd created more in other areas of the American Midwest. Bol's initial goal was 2,510 Little Free Libraries. Does that sound arbitrary? It's not. He wanted to one-up Andrew Carnegie, whose philanthropic efforts established 2,509 libraries.

Todd Bol accomplished this goal by 2012, and his idea spread over the world. Literally, there are Little Free Libraries in 115 countries, numbering as many as 150,000 locations. Today the Little Free Library is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization whose goal is to expand access to books to all, regardless of background, and to foster community building through a shared love of reading.

GROWING OUR ENDOWMENT

Now that the Friends have established an endowment fund to support the Hennepin County Library collection, our thoughts have turned to growing the principal in the endowment. Since an endowment gift is given with the intent of preserving the original value of the gift, while growing it over time, only the accumulated appreciation and income on the investment are used to fund the annual distributions. As the endowment grows, so do the distributions. There are three options that are commonly used to grow an endowment: making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), including the fund in an estate plan, and making a legacy gift.

Making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), is a great way to donate to a charity and also reduce your taxable income. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity, up to \$100,000 per year. QCDs are excluded from your taxable income, so you can get a tax break for your donation. You must be at least 70.5 years old to make a QCD, and the charity must be a qualified 501(c)(3) organization. To qualify, donations must be made directly from your IRA to the charity and not through a donor-advised fund.

Another more long-term method of contributing to the Endowment is to keep it in mind as you do your estate planning. Funding can be accomplished with cash, bonds and shares of public companies, as well as real estate, life insurance policies, private securities, charitable gift annuities, artwork, jewelry and intellectual property.

A gift to the Endowment can also honor a special event in the life of a friend or loved one such as a special birthday or anniversary, and it can be a lasting memorial as well after their life has ended.

Anything else you would like to add?


