# 2025 Year-to-date Financial Highlights


We've started 2025 strong with our three income streams:

- Our January book sale brought in \$7,659. This sale is in our top three most successful book sales and was our largest January sale on record.
- Donations received from the Ready Reads carts of used books in the library lobby brought in \$1,200 in just two months.
- Memberships accounted for another \$775.

From our income, we've sent a grant to the Friends of Hennepin County Library (FHCL) in the amount of \$7,000 designated to be used for the collection, which benefits all 41 libraries. The graphic below describes how the remaining book sales will benefit the Library.

At the end of 2024, the Friends of the Plymouth Library received a generous \$5,000 donation from one individual. That donation has been sent as a grant to the FHCL designated to be used for local programs at the Plymouth Library.

The Friends of the Plymouth Library \$25,000 endowment fund that was set up in November 2022 has a value of \$30,461 at the end of 2024. This endowment is designated for the collection. The first appropriation will occur in the first quarter of 2026.

Shimura has appeared across eleven novels to date. Sujata Massey is also the pen behind the popular *Perveen Mistry* series. Modeled on a historic Parsi attorney who practiced law in the 1920s, Mistry is the first female lawyer in cosmopolitan Mumbai - and one of the first ever in India. *The Mistress of Bhatia House* (2023), the fourth and latest installment, garnered Massey her third Agatha Award.






